

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 in Community Care and Primary Care Settings

A one day course

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 will have a considerable impact on staff and organizations delivering healthcare and social care in community and primary care settings (including community nurses, allied health professionals, general practitioners and day centre workers). Staff need to know how the Act will affect them, their working practices and the people they provide care for. This course provides the essential knowledge that primary and community care staff need in order to work with and implement the Act effectively and ensure compliance with the legislation. Practical issues in using the legislation are considered and addressed.
