

THE NEW MENTAL HEALTH ACT 2007 – IMPACT & CHANGE- A One Day Training Course

The Mental Health Act 2007 will have a considerable impact on Primary Care Trusts and their staff. The Act amends key parts of the 1983 Mental Health Act and introduces new rights such as advocacy; new powers such as Community Treatment Orders and new duties upon organisations. Staff need to know how the new Act will affect them, their working practices and the people to whom they provide services. This course provides essential knowledge staff need in order to work with and implement the Act effectively, ensuring compliance with the legislation. Practical issues in using the legislation are considered and addressed.
